**SPRING BOOK FAIR** From Teresa Dorshorst: On behalf of my co-chair, Crystal Schaefer and myself, we would like to thank the children and families who purchased books from our recent book fair. Our goal is to create an interest and to motivate students to read more. Research has proven that with a good selection of books, all children read more. And those who read more books get more practice and become better readers. In a recent study, 91% of children ages 6-17 said "My favorite books are the ones that I have picked out myself." With that being said, it is with great pride that we inform you for the two book fairs we have held this year our families have purchased a total of **958** books. It has been calculated that the average minutes of voluntary reading per student is 334 in a school year, therefore the total minutes of voluntary reading by our students is 97,560. We sincerely hope our students enjoy their "summer reads"!

**Research says...** According to Dr. Jim Rosborg of McKendree University, missing 6 or more days of school has a negative effect on academic performance. I also read once that teacher attendance has an even greater impact. Our teachers missed 119.75 days this year collectively. Factor out a scary car accident and parental needs and you find the number is 56.75 days. **Average per teacher was 2.8 days missed.** This translates to better instruction and greater chances of success for our students! Thanks to the ICS Faculty for working on staying healthy and taking their work so seriously! Make sure your child has a work ethic---everyone is supposed to do their chores!
