Re: New ICS Consolidated Billing and Payment System

Dear Parents,

Consolidated bills will be sent by email beginning the first week of September to email addresses currently on file with the school office. If you prefer a different email address be used or to receive by mail, please advise when emails are received. Subsequent bills will be emailed the first week of every month (or more frequently if past due). We will be using the billing system available through the parish accounting system. The bills will include (where applicable) tuition, book fees, band, lunch and latchkey for convenience. Any outstanding bills from prior years will be included along with outstanding balances for the current school year. The email will contain a link if you prefer to pay by credit card (currently at no cost to parents). The new credit card processor replaces DiamondMind. The first time you pay by credit card, you will need to create a user name and password when clicking on the email link. Retain your password for future reference. We will be replacing the DiamondMind links on the school website with the new processor link with the first electronic billing. If you would like to have funds sent directly to ICS from your bank account, please contact Sheryl Oglesby in the parish office for the proper form.

As previously communicated, all fees must be paid in advance.

With the first invoice, any family using lunch service that has not already prepaid will receive an invoice for one month prepaid (\$54 or 5 lunches x 4 weeks x \$2.70) in addition to the lunch ordered for August. Each subsequent month's billing will replenish the lunch balance for what was used during the prior month. Lunch balances will continue to be available by viewing Mystudentprogress.com. We will adopt the current practice of most schools that if a student is two weeks past due on lunch bill, he/she will only be able to receive a cheese sandwich or cheese and crackers until paid up. Federal support is available through the lunch program application if you qualify. The form is on-line and available through the school's website.

The Pre-K and Pre-school programs are to be self-funded. They will be billed and must be paid

each month in advance just like any other daycare provider. Invoices not paid by the end of the month will halt service until account is current or payment arrangements have been made.

Band will be billed and must be paid each month in advance or student will not be able to participate until account is current or payment arrangements have been made.

Latchkey must be kept current within one month of service to continue. We also anticipate that Latchkey statements will continue to be sent out by Hope on a bi-weekly basis to keep parents advised of the current amount due.

As a reminder, outstanding bills must be paid before graduating or enrolling each year. As in the past, we want all children to be able to attend ICS if they wish. But families must be held accountable to have bills paid on a timely basis to be able to pay teachers and keep the school operating on budget. If you need assistance, please contact Mr. Kish or myself for consideration as soon as possible to make the necessary arrangements, as commitments in writing will be required. We believe that these changes are needed and fair to all school families, as we need everyone to comply and pay timely for services used. Thanks for your consideration of this important matter.

WHO DO YOU SAY I AM? DO YOU REALLY LOVE ME? I like to think that Jesus would only have these two questions in His version of the catechism. Christ, "the Anointed One", earned Simon the honor of a name change. Probably just as important is the question we need to ask of ourselves "who do we say we are?" Do we follow The Way? Or is our god with a little g that can never really make us happy. "*Money isn't everything but it calms my nerves*" is one of my favorite quotes. Yet when I seem to run out of money, something just drops in my lap. And it is no accident. So who do I say that I am? Child of God, Divine heir! Now if only I could act like it.

Jesus asked this question at a critical point in his public life and preaching. A political commentator today might say that Jesus had reached his peak of popularity and it was now on the decline. The early enthusiasm of those who followed him was waning. There was growing opposition from some religious leaders; some followers were beginning to question aspects of his teaching, and some had given up on him and walked away. Moreover, Jesus is about to tell them that "he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priest and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day."

So he wants to know where his inner circle of disciples are with regard to him. Are they ready to enter into a more profound and deeper relationship with him? Are they committed enough and faithful enough to stay with him not only in good times but also in difficult times and in the bad times of hostility and persecution which were even now coming. They would not be able to do this unless they have a better and more correct understanding of who he is, and if they were not graced with a deeper faith and trust in him and in his word. So Jesus asks his question, "Who do people say that the Son of Man is?" Jesus wants them to deal with this issue, to confirm interiorly and out loud for themselves others who he is for them.

I believe each of us in our own way has to grapple with this question. In fact, for believers I think it is perhaps the most important issue of our faith. How we perceive and deal with this reality, how we understand and perceive this profound yet wonderful mystery sets the stage, lays the groundwork and foundation for all, or practically all, other considerations of our faith life. May we be blessed with the grace and insight that Peter received. -Fr. Jim Blumeyer, SJ

Call to Action

Dear Parent,



History is on the verge of being made in Illinois education, and you and your family can be part of it. State lawmakers and the governor are grappling with a new education funding formula for public schools. But also in the mix is the **Scholarship Tax Credit** we've been pushing for two years. This initiative gives students **across the state** access to a quality education. Now is the **first time** such a program has been seriously considered in Illinois.

It works like this: A scholarship program would be created for students to attend a Catholic or other private school of their choice. These scholarships would be funded from corporate and individual donations to scholarship-granting organizations. To encourage these donations, contributors would get a state income tax credit.

Just think of how many families these scholarships would help. We have a chance to fulfill the

guidance of Pope Francis, as eloquently stated in *Amoris Laetitia*:

"... the overall education of children is a 'most serious duty' and at the same time a 'primary right' of parents."

7 Skills Managers AND WORKERS Will Need In 2025 As you plan your management career years from now, here are the skills you'll need to succeed. [BY GWEN MORAN](#) 5 MINUTE READ

We all know that the [work landscape is changing](#). The [jobs that will be in demand are shifting](#) as more are automated by artificial intelligence, machine learning, and robots. Teams are becoming more disparate and globalization has added new collaboration challenges. At the same time, more millennials are taking on management roles, and even our work spaces will undergo changes between now and 2025.

"Change will be happening so quickly that [50% of the occupations that exist today will not exist 10 years from now](#). So we're going to be living in an environment that is extremely adaptable and changing all the time," says Liz Bentley, the founder of [Liz Bentley Associates](#), a leadership development consulting firm.

So as you plan your future career, be sure to keep these skills at the forefront.

TECHNOLOGY MANAGEMENT SKILLS Technology is going to "grow alongside of us," says Bentley, and there will be no job that is immune from its effects. Of course, it won't be a straight line from where we are now to machine learning and robots taking over the workplace, but [technology will become an ever-present factor in the workplace](#). That will create new challenges, conflicts, and opportunities related to skill building, workplace roles, data management, privacy, and others. Managers will need to understand technology enough to keep abreast of and anticipate emerging issues. Some technological developments will work, some won't, and some will evolve, she says. But the constant is that managers will need to not only be comfortable with embracing new technology, but they'll also have to be adept at managing the changing relationship between people and emerging tech.

OUTCENTRIC LEADERSHIP SKILLS Effective managers and leaders are going to need to be less egocentric, Bentley says. "I'm the leader and you will listen to me," approaches aren't going to work in a tight labor market made up primarily of millennials. Bentley says managers will need to be more "outcentric," focusing on developing the people and teams around them to be active and valued contributors. The best managers will look at the overarching need, and then build and develop a team to meet that need—with input from the team—instead of dictating what the team needs.

SOFT-SKILL ASSESSMENT Effective managers are going to have to be as good at evaluating candidates and employees for soft skills as they are for technical skills, says Rita Santelli, CEO of innovation consulting firm [Savvy](#), and an adjunct faculty member teaching strategic and innovative leadership at Georgetown University. The best employees are going to have strong critical thinking and creative problem-solving skills as the pace of the workplace continues to accelerate. Managers are going to have to be both inherently able to spot those abilities in others, and also stay abreast of emerging tools and assessments that more accurately evaluate them in candidates and developing employees.

ROWE FOCUS Companies will adopt more elements of Results-Only Work Environments (ROWEs), says Jennifer Currence, president of [OnCore Management Solutions](#), a performance solutions consulting company. This HR management strategy, created by workplace consultants Cali Ressler and Jody Thompson, focuses on autonomy and accountability. In other words, effective managers will create environments that focus less on where and how people work, but which measure success based on results and output, she says. The use of contractors will continue to rise, and managers will need to think differently about how they assemble the skills necessary to meet their objectives. Focus will need to shift away from process, except in terms of how to optimize it for better results, she says.

"As we shift to a workforce that is 100% autonomous and 100% accountable, performance is based on the results they create, not the hours they work. As we see more workplaces like this and more flexibility in the workplace, managers are really going to have to focus more on the communication aspects and relationship management," she says.
