So...For our new folks haven't made a pledge yet, we are involved in a CAPITAL CAMPAIGN FOR OUR CATHOLIC EDUCATION AND ACTIVITY CENTER. We need your help! Here is some of the history---

*Once upon a time...around the 1840's...The Catholics living here in Columbia got tired of a circuit riding priest having Mass in their homes and thought if they became a parish and built a church, we could get a priest. So in 1846 that happened! In 1853, part of the Church became a school. In 1867 the church was too small so a new one was built on Main Street for \$12,000 with money borrowed at 8% interest. It was unfinished for 10 years. In 1921, a new school and community hall was built---the Church was remodeled and added onto in 1928---the school added onto in 1950---again in 1960--- again in 1987. The church was air-conditioned in 1982. In 1996 the parish wanted to expand the Church. The Holy Spirit said no---take the pledges and leave town---(Yes, God really spoke to us!) in 2003 we bought 35+ acres---then we got a new pastor---then we built a new church and dedicated it in 2013. In 2016 we sold our Main Street campus and are now **renters** after deciding to build a new **CEAC**. In October of 2016, our Church loan was paid off. 50 years from now, someone will say... Once upon a time.....And as Fr. Carl says---**let us continue to work as if everything depends upon us and let us continue to pray knowing that everything depends upon God.***

58,400 square feet—on schedule---October foundation pouring---on budget---530 pledges(needs to grow(you?))---2 classrooms per grade---bigger gym---over 30,000 cubic yards of earth already moved(would fill up 25 Columbia home basements)





Young Authors
Fall 2017



Sharpen your pencils, for it is time to start preparing for the Fall Young Authors' program! The fall turn-in day will be Monday, October 2nd (this will also be a jeans day for every student turning in a manuscript). For judging purposes, please do not write your name on your story, but do include a title. We ask that you attach your name either by a Post-It note or on a separate piece of paper (attached by paper clip or stapled). The chairpersons will record the titles and names, and then remove the names from the stories before giving them to the judges. Your story will be identified solely by its title. Give your submission to your teacher (5th-8th grade students please give your manuscript to your English teacher). Winning stories from k-4th will be presented at the Young Authors' assembly, at school, on Wednesday, October 25th. The following information may answer any questions you have. How should my work be packaged? Your submission should include the following:

- Your name attached only by paper clip or post-it note (names are removed for judging)
- A title
- Pages securely fastened by staple or other means
- A front cover (it can be as simple as a title page)

What should I write, and how will it be judged? The emphasis of the Young Authors program is on creativity! A parent volunteer will judge your work based on its originality, its organization (does your story have a beginning, middle, and ending?), and on its use of clear, descriptive words. Stories are evaluated based 75% on creativity and 25% on grammar and punctuation. You may also enter a poem. It will be judged based on its creativity, how well it flows, and on the strength and clarity of its message. For upper grades, a poem or collection of poems should have at least 20 lines total.

Students in grades 5 through 8 may also enter non-fiction essays including classroom assignments. Judges will be looking for clear, descriptive sentences and well-organized paragraphs. Any submission may be written at home or as part of a classroom assignment. Please do not submit work that has been entered in Young Authors competition in a previous year.

Can my parents help me? Young Authors is designed to encourage you to write, and so the work must be your own. You can try out your ideas on your parents if you like, and they can help you with proofreading grammar, punctuation and spelling. Very young authors may tell their story to a parent while the parent writes it down. The child may then write out the story, or the parent may write it or type it. It is important that the story be "in the child's own words," which is the state rule for the Young Authors program. Parents should encourage their children to work on their submissions as independently as possible.

What if I win? Congratulations! You may win a Young Authors' trophy once each school year. If you win a trophy, be sure to keep entering! Your future submissions are still eligible to win runner-up awards.

By entering repeatedly, you are also eligible to receive special awards at the end of the year. Students in grade k-4 receive their Young Authors awards at presentations following each judging. Older students receive theirs at the Awards Night in May. Enter twice, and you receive a Young Authors' pin at the end of the year.

All winners from fall and spring are entered into a drawing, and one randomly selected student from each grade will be invited to attend the regional Young Authors' Conference.

What are the details on the Young Authors' Conference? Winning in either the fall or the spring makes students eligible for the honor of representing their grade and ICS at the Regional and State Young Authors' Conference. Attendees will be randomly selected – one per grade.

Gospel MT 18:15-20

Jesus said to his disciples: "If your brother sins against you, go and tell him his fault between you and him alone. If he listens to you, you have won over your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others along with you, so that every fact may be established on the testimony of two or three witnesses. If he refuses to listen to them, tell the church. If he refuses to listen even to the church, then treat him as you would a Gentile or a tax collector."

WOW! This is a hard preach! So...**to the experts**..Fr. Richard Rohr OFM

Not all criticism is blind negativity. Healthy critique offers hope and vision when we own our

complicity in the problem. People who love something have earned the right to make it better and keep it true to its deepest vision. We must first recognize that God has something to teach us personally, not just the group or institution. The way through is always much more difficult than the way around. Cheap religion gives us the way around, avoiding darkness. True religion gives us the way through, stepping right into the mystery. Darkness is sacred ground. The God who calls us into darkness will also sustain us and lead us through it. "God . . . brings the dead to life and calls into being what does not yet exist" (Romans 4:17). Resurrection is the one and only pattern.

And... Fr. Anthony Wieck, S.J.

Perhaps one of the hardest things we have to do in this life is "fraternal correction." Scripture speaks of its importance. Jesus exhorts us to it in this Sunday's Gospel. Certainly we would prefer to follow the world's mantras: "Don't judge the actions of another" and "Live and let live", for there is no possible conflict that way... But Jesus instructs us otherwise, "Go and tell [your brother] his fault." (Mt 18:15)

St. Ignatius, at the beginning of his Spiritual Exercises, adds some important qualifiers to balanced fraternal correction. In what he calls the Presupposition, he writes, "...Let it be presupposed that every good Christian is to be more ready to save his neighbor's proposition than to condemn it. If he cannot save it, let him inquire how he means it; and if he means it badly, let him correct him with charity. If that is not enough, let him seek all the suitable means to bring him to mean it well, and save himself."

Correction does need to happen, for the love we have toward others. But we must avoid a simple condemnation of the words or opinions of others. Instead we should search carefully for the inner truth of their statement or expression, and hold on to that truth, and help them discard the rest. If we can't find some truth to hold on to, we are to ask what they intend by it. Give them an explanatory chance! And if they are still holding on to something in error, we are to correct them, but always and only in charity. This will lead them gently towards the truth that we ourselves are trying to follow.

From Social Studies Class/Religion;... Freedom of Speech is often used as an excuse to be racist, sexist, bigoted, and just plain inappropriate. We never have a "right" to do a wrong thing. Wrong is wrong. We are human. We don't have to "like one another", just "love one another". And that means respecting our differences and our right to disagree and still stay within the right way.

From where I sit I often have to "correct" students, teachers, others, myself. I don't have all the answers. Sometimes, when we know why we do what we do, say in liturgy, or rules, we understand and self-correct. Or if we share the one ball at recess with others, we all have fun---our fun is magnified. Sometimes we have to call each other out. Sometimes I have to be called out that I hurt feelings and am misinterpreted. Back when I was a "baby Principal", one of the first things I learned, according to Walt Disney, was that *95% of all problems were communications problems*. So sending generic emails to all when one is messing up, snarky comments on Facebook, or a letter to the Office of Education would be better served if we confronted issues directly. I often tell teachers that the 6 page email they received from a parent might be solved faster with a phone call or a sit-down. An 8 page justification or explanation reply can keep it going on and on like a *thank you for the thank you for the thank you* that I sometimes get caught up in.

So...come and hear Jesus talk to you in Scripture this weekend and know that **"where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them."**


