Call to Worship Last School Mass in the Church on Main Good Morning. *Today we celebrate the final all school Mass in our church here on Main Street which has been our school's spiritual home for over 150 years. This beautiful building, that we love, has brought us many wonderful memories—many moments of grace. In the Gospel today we hear Jesus say, "ask and you*

shall receive". We have asked for a new church and a new school. And our God, who always provides just what we need, has answered. Before we take leave, we stop to honor and pay tribute to each of those who answered the call and served as Pastor at Immaculate Conception Parish:

Our parish was founded in 1846 and was served by visiting priests. The first church at Immaculate Conception was directed by Father Peter Baltes of Waterloo in 1853. He later became Bishop of Alton. In 1874 the school was staffed by the Ursuline Sisters. In 1890 the Sister Adorers of the Blood of Christ were placed in charge of the school. In 1899 the school was staffed by the Poor Handmaids of Christ. Returning in 1909, the Precious Blood sisters from Ruma were given charge of the school through 1975 ending with Principal, Sister Renee Janson. During the 75 years in which the Ruma Sisters staffed the school, more than 100 sisters served in Columbia. Since 1975 the school has been directed by lay staff, our own Mr. Kish.

Six former ICS students have been named as National Catholic Education Association Distinguished Graduates: Eugene Schorb, Sr. Marica Kruse, ASC, Brother Herb Janson, S.M., Mark Herrmann, Ph.D., Fr. John Weissler, OMI, Sr. Mary Joan Weissler, ASC.

As the procession enters, make note as we honor those families which have been for generations enrolled at ICS since the earliest days of the Parish. (some 50 students processed in)

We have worshipped here as a school family and today we say goodbye to a sacred building, but not our God. We praise and thank God for the gift of this beautiful church, the work of human hands, which has served our parish and our school family with an estimated 24,000 class masses since it was dedicated on December 12th, 1867.

Please rise and join in singing using our Liturgy aid Immaculate Mary.

REFLECTIONS ON THE POPE'S MONTHLY INTENTIONS

Human Trafficking. *That human trafficking, the modern form of slavery, may be eradicated.*

Pope Francis' October universal prayer intention shocks us with the fact that human trafficking-- kidnapping, transporting, selling, and buying men, women, and children—is, in fact, nothing less than slavery. Slavery is not some ancient historical practice human beings outgrew; slavery is rampant today. According to the Global Slavery Index, over 30 million people around the world are slaves. Seventy-eight percent are enslaved for labor and 22 percent for sex. The country with the highest percentage of slaves is Mauritania, Africa, at 4 percent. In India over 14 million people are enslaved. Here in the U.S., more than 60,000 people are enslaved.

Pope Francis called human trafficking a "crime against humanity" and "an open wound on the body of contemporary society, a scourge upon the body of Christ." The Pope made human trafficking the focus of his Message for this year's World Day of Peace, noting the many kinds of slavery: modern slaves are people forced into labor, prostitution, selling or smuggling drugs, begging, or military service. Some are kidnapped for sale of their organs or held for ransom. The Pope says sin is the deep cause of slavery. "Whenever sin corrupts the human heart and distances us from our Creator and our neighbors, the latter are no longer regarded as beings of equal dignity, as brothers or sisters sharing a common humanity, but rather as objects." Pope Francis ended his Message with the challenge: "We know that God will ask each of us: What did you do for your brother?" We can ask ourselves: what can I do to end human trafficking? Our prayer this month for the end of human trafficking is a beginning

RECONCILING "IN THOSE TIMES..." --- Centuries ago, all kinds of things illegal today were permissible. Slavery. Capital punishment. Public shaming in stocks. Stoning to death. Indentured servitude. I would like to believe we have progressed but the evil in us finds a way around the law and new crimes are created. So we try to explain the canonization of Junipero Serra for spreading the faith while destroying the culture of indigenous people. Part of the explanation is "in those times" ...doesn't make it right but people had not stood up to the injustice of the "norm" yet. We need to stand up to the injustice of human trafficking. Atlanta is its capital in the United States from a report last year.

RELICS AND THE CHURCH

My dear parents,

Grandpa's old pocket watch ... a photograph from your parents' wedding day ... even the sacred ground in which the remains of our ancestors are buried ...

These "mementos" from our loved ones are priceless to a family. And the same is true of "relics" in the family of the Church! A relic is an object, such as a piece of clothing or, more commonly, a piece of bone from a saint's body – which has a spiritual value because it belonged to one of *God's saints*.

- The Bible records many accounts of the value of relics and even episodes of miraculous events connected with them: "*People brought to Jesus all who were sick and begged Him that they might only touch the tassel of His cloak, and as many as touched it were healed*" (Matt 14, Mark 6, Luke 8).
- When the corpse of a man was touched to the bones of the prophet Elisha the man came back to life and rose to his feet (2 Kings).
- Look also at Acts 5, where even Peter's shadow could cause miraculous healings; and in Acts 19, "*God did extraordinary miracles through Paul, so that even handkerchiefs and aprons that had touched him were taken to the sick, and their illnesses were cured and the evil spirits left them.*"

This is not "superstition"; relics are not magic, they do not contain a power that is their own – no power separate from God. *Any good that comes about through a relic is God's doing!*

From the beginning, we Catholics have carefully preserved relics and honored them. And as we venerate (not *worship*) the relics of saints, in honoring them we are honoring Jesus.

This is not something "from the middle ages." As far back as the early Church – from the first century – Christians preserved and venerated the remains of martyrs – NOT in competition with their unique worship of God but as an important part of it. St. Jerome wrote: "*We honor the servants that their honor may be reflected upon their Lord!*"

All of this stems from Jesus Christ Himself: from the beginning of Christ's human life – *the Incarnation* – through His own *Resurrection*. "The Word became Flesh" – and Christ has saved His people *body and soul!* Relics, therefore, are not *gruesome*. The human body is honored: *for it has been a temple of the Holy Spirit!* And we "look forward to the Resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come."

That old pocket watch ... the photos from years gone by ... the cemetery ... all these are, in a sense, relics ... as are the bones of the great Saints who have gone before us. On Monday, October 19, we will welcome the relics of the "Little Saint of Great Mercy" – Saint Maria Goretti. Gathered in our Cathedral around her relic, more precious than the most exquisite jewels and more purified than gold, the Lord will gather us in joy – in order to commemorate the heroes that have gone before, and to train the heroes yet to come.
