

<u>The Bi-County Regional Superintendent's Office</u> is hoping to be pro-active on the issue of suicide in our communities. On Friday, December 7, they will host an in-service for 7th and 8th grades on the topic at CHS and Grades 7-8 we will be invited once I get the details. Time should be around 1:00 at CHS.

Since the start of school this year the specter of suicide has struck our schools multiple times. Only weeks ago, a young high school student took his own life. This past week another adolescent attempted suicide but survived. Last year, students in multiple schools areawide died at their own hands. The proximity of two impactful suicide events -- one carried out tragically and another attempted, in a month's time, drives the Regional Office of Education for Monroe and Randolph Counties to take up the baton and enter this issue with all the force and persuasion the office can muster.

Like a relay, it must start somewhere, but we all have to accept the challenge as a team. And we cannot drop that baton. We need everyone to participate in the prevention of these overwhelming events."

The statistics relating to suicide are devastating. Human Support Service in Waterloo reports that from July 11, 2016 to Nov. 17, 2016, they have dealt with 253 calls to help potential suicide victims in Monroe County. Nearly half have involved young people 18 and under. Thirty percent of the hundreds of suicide calls in the past year in Randolph County were from adolescents, reports Kendra Kennedy, director of counseling for Human Service Center of Red Bud, Suicide is not exclusive to any age group. An adult committed suicide the same day as the high school student noted above. More recently, another community member was talked out of jumping from the Jefferson Barracks Bridge. Nationwide, 22 veterans commit suicide each and every day, according to released statistics. This problem cannot be solved through school level education and intervention alone. Schools cannot "cure" the problem as the issues underlying suicide are complex and schools are not mental health service providers.

Likewise, our legal system and even families, without strong support, are challenged to take on these issues. According to HSS's Anne King, a study in 2004, told us that 87 percent of people who commit suicide have mental health issues. And many of those contributing factors stem from traumatic episodes that begin in childhood and may continue throughout individual and family development. They include such things as drug and alcohol abuse, divorce, sexual abuse, incarceration of a family member, violence in the home, bullying, cutting, and many more triggers that stem from or lead to anxiety, depression, and despair. It will take our entire community to act with prevention and intervention. Your local Regional Office of Education is joining with groups, agencies and organizations across our two counties.

Our communities must join in this effort if it is to be successful. And it must succeed. Like infections, which spread often from person to person, suicide is not to be handled after the fact, but in a preventative manner. We need to discuss what parents, friends, family and kids can do about this scourge. This is not someone else's problem. Rather, it is our problem and the solution must be ours

as well. Unfortunately, most people are reluctant to try, or have little idea of how to intervene in this critical issue. We have to own the issue and learn how to intervene. Area schools are addressing suicide with students, teachers and staff, in collaboration with the Regional Office of Education, Human Support Services, Human Service Center and the Maidez Center with direct presentations to junior high and high school students. We as citizens of our two counties must step up to the greater challenge – all of us – before it can be turned and behavior can be redirected in a healthier direction. There is something each of us can do, right now. Several sessions to learn about, discuss and come together, are slated for all citizens in Monroe and Randolph counties. The first is Thursday, Dec. 1, at Waterloo High School. It will start at 6 p.m., and last until about 7:30 p.m. Two community presentations are being scheduled in Randolph County the week of Dec. 6. This effort to educate and deal with issue is not going to have an ending date. A comprehensive plan to address this and other related issues is underway.
